WHAT IS 'SPECIFIED SKILLED WORKER'?

'Specified Skilled Worker' is a residency status introduced by the Government of Japan in April 2019, allowing aspiring Indian youth to work and reside in Japan. This status was created to address Japan's severe labor shortages by accepting foreign workers with specific skills and expertise.

As of July 2022, Japan has signed Specified Skilled Worker Memorandums of Cooperation (MoC) with 15 countries, including India.

TECHNICAL INTERN TRAINING PROGRAM (TITP)

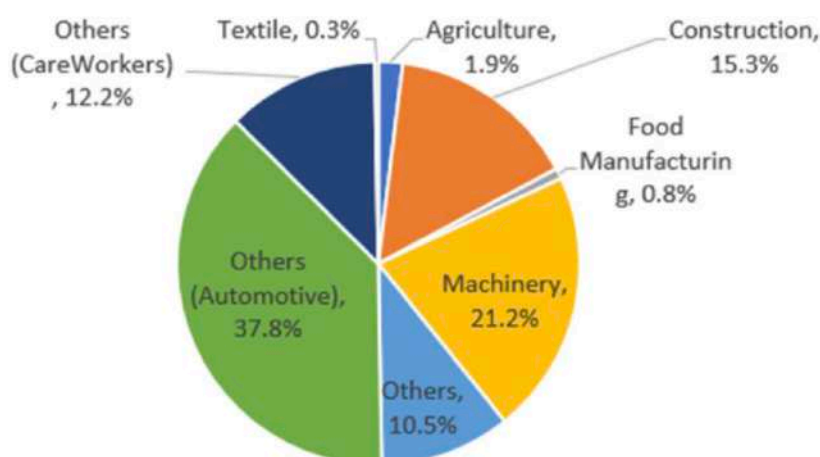


The Technical Intern Training Program (TITP) was initiated in Japan back in 1993 with the aim of supporting developing countries by hosting their citizens and imparting skills through On-the-Job Training (OJT).

In alignment with India's ambition to become the skill capital of the world, the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship (MSDE), Government of India, has undertaken various measures to bolster skill development initiatives. One significant step in this direction was the signing of a Memorandum of Cooperation (MoC) with Japan's Ministry of Justice, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare on October 17, 2017.

Under this collaborative program, individuals from India are selected to undergo internships lasting three to five years in Japan. Upon completion of their internships, they are required to return to India and apply the skills they have acquired during their time in Japan. To oversee the implementation of this program, the MSDE appointed the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) in January 2018 to serve as the monitoring body.

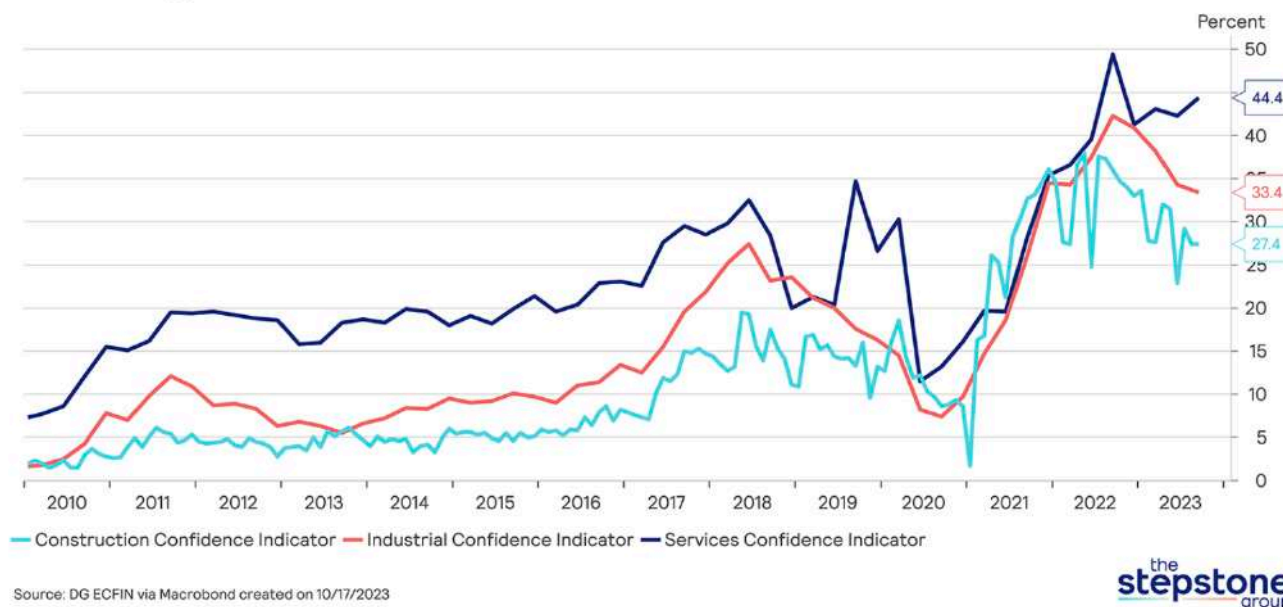

Teaching Japanese and German enables colleges to build stronger ties with international universities and companies from Japan and Germany.

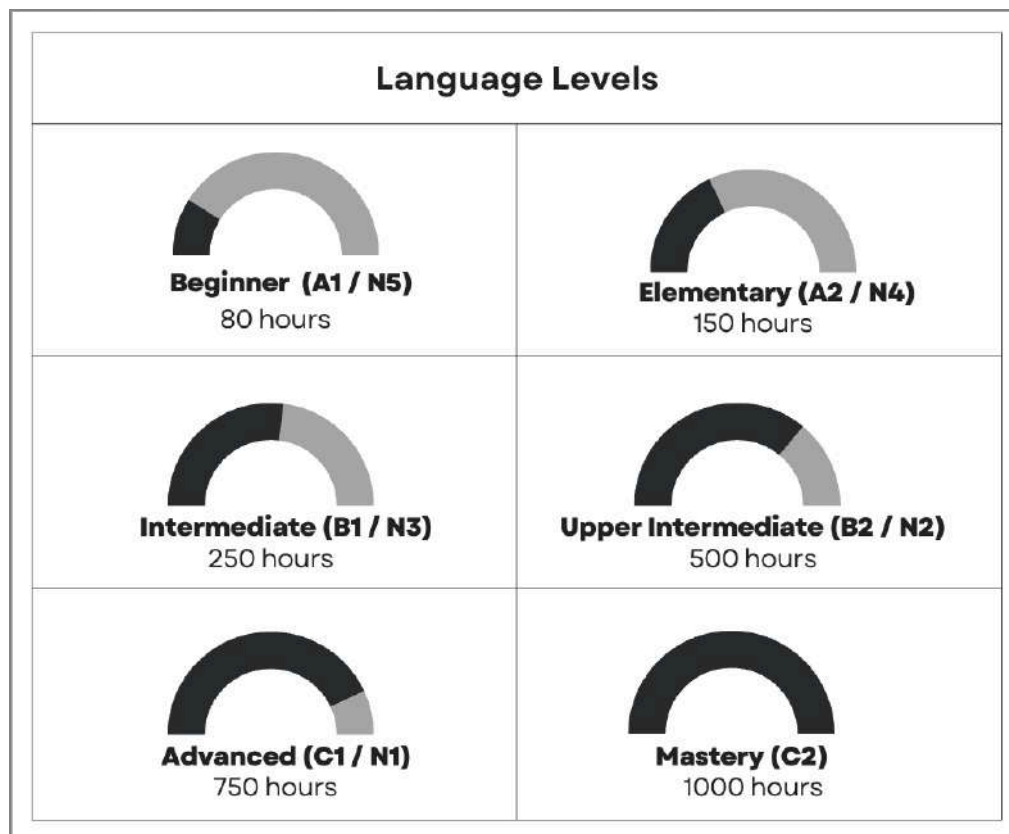
Access to World-Class Education and Research
